MANY HANDS MAKE LIGHT WORK AS NATIONAL TRUST FOR SCOTLAND MARKS THE START OF VOLUNTEERS' WEEK

- Staff from National Trust for Scotland and People's Postcode Lottery volunteered at Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve
- Volunteers assisted with preparation for conservation project at the reserve to mark the start of Volunteers' Week from 1 – 7 June
- Celebration of vital contribution made by volunteers to the conservation charity throughout the year

The National Trust for Scotland celebrated the start of Volunteers' Week on Thursday 1 June by welcoming volunteers to Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve to assist with preparation for a new conservation project.

Members of staff from the conservation charity alongside the communications team from People's Postcode Lottery, based in Edinburgh, visited the nature reserve near Killin, to help remove fencing in preparation for a new conservation project. This project, inspired by the successful use of GPS software in the collars of cows for conservation grazing at the Trust's Threave estate, will see cattle grazing an area of the nature reserve, to benefit open ground habitats and promote natural regeneration of woodland and scrub.

Members of the team from People's Postcode Lottery showed their support for the National Trust for Scotland by joining the Trust's Volunteers' Week activity at Ben Lawers. This comes after it was recently announced that Postcode Earth Trust would continue to support the Trust's vital conservation work at the National Nature Reserves in its care through additional funding, thanks to players of People's Postcode Lottery, who have now raised more than £1.1 billion for thousands of charities and local good causes. This includes a total of over £2.5m for the National Trust for Scotland to support its work to enrich and protect Scotland's natural heritage, since 2014.

Funding from the Love Our Nature project by People's Postcode Lottery has been confirmed for 2023/24 that will support conservation at Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve including the appointment of two seasonal staff, an ecologist, Lewis Donaghy, who will monitor mountain plant life on the reserve's seven Munros, and a ranger, James McGurk, who will engage with visitors, carry out vital maintenance work on footpaths to protect the landscape and contribute to the pioneering habitat restoration.

Helen Cole, National Trust for Scotland Property Manager at Ben Lawers, said: "As a conservation charity we benefit from the generous support of a host of volunteers who give up their time to help us care for and protect some of Scotland's most important natural and cultural heritage. Over 2000 volunteers work alongside members of the Trust's staff throughout the year at our historic properties and countryside places, like Ben Lawers, to assist with collections care, visitor engagement and important habitat restoration and conservation work. Volunteering provides a great opportunity to give something back while also having positive benefits to health and wellbeing, with volunteers learning new skills and boosting self-esteem.

"Alongside the support of our members and donors, the additional funding provided through the Love Our Nature project by People's Postcode Lottery enhances the work of the Trust and helps us to advance our charity's species monitoring, habitat restoration and regeneration work, allowing us to preserve Scotland's landscape and wildlife for future generations to enjoy. This funding has also enabled the Trust to leverage further support from our donors by unlocking funding from a wider supporter base, for which we're very grateful. Conservation projects at our National Nature Reserves support our objectives to improve the condition of our estate, enrich Scotland's protected heritage and enable nature to flourish, outlined in our 10-year Nature, Beauty & Heritage for Everyone strategy."

Head of Charities at <u>People's Postcode Lottery</u>, Laura Chow, said: "We're delighted that members of our team were able to assist the Trust by volunteering their support to the team at Ben Lawers in preparation for their new conservation project. This is thanks to funds raised by players across Britain who have raised over £2.5 million for the National Trust for Scotland. This support enables their vital work in maintaining and protecting our natural landscape now and into the future."
