SCOTTISH MOVIE STAR AND WRITER SHARES HIS CUMMING HOME PLANS

 Alan Cumming admits wanting to be based in Scotland on the latest episode of the National Trust for Scotland's podcast, Love Scotland

Movie star, writer, actor and performer, Alan Cumming, has revealed that as he gets older, he feels more and more connected to Scotland and wants to be 'more based' here. His admission features in the latest episode of the National Trust for Scotland's podcast series, Love Scotland, out now.

Talking to podcast presenter and the conservation charity's President, Jackie Bird, whom Alan previously worked with in Dundee when they were teenagers, Alan says that he 'feels like [Scotland] is such a good place to be in the world right now'.

When Jackie asks: "So, is it time for Alan Cumming to click his heels together and say there's no place like home?", he responds: "I think I've always said that [I will]. There's a thing about going away from your country. Sometimes people think in some way you're abandoning it. But actually, the reasons that people go away is because they have been successful in their country. Work took me to other places.

Speaking from California, he continues: "I settled in New York and life happened, but I think your understanding of who you are and what you are is much stronger because of travelling. I feel very connected to Scotland, more and more. So, as I get older, I feel I want to be more based there. And to be able to come back and forward. I always love being in Scotland. And I just feel like it's such a good place to be in the world right now."

Alan is an enthusiastic advocate and supporter of conservation charity, the National Trust for Scotland, which cares for over 100 sites across the country, from castles to coastlines. He regularly bids through the National Trust for Scotland Foundation USA to stay in the Scottish Trust's historic properties and has previously stayed in Fyvie Castle and the House of Dun. He has also had the honour of presenting the USA Trust's Great Scot Award to Scots comedian Billy Connolly, an award Alan has also received.

In the podcast, Alan talks about his upbringing on a country estate just outside of Angus, his passion for Scotland's heritage, its people, and the Scots' "good, kind values". He touches on his career to date, including his recent show Burn which challenges the 'biscuit tin' image of Scotland's famous bard through music and dance and toured from

Greenock to New York. He also speaks about "researching himself" for his autobiographies and shares stories of his famous friends, including Liza Minnelli.

Jim Whyteside, Interim Director of Customer & Cause at National Trust for Scotland, said: "The Love Scotland podcast is focused on celebrating Scotland's rich history, culture and its people which aligns with our mission of providing every single person access through stories and experiences to our country's diverse nature, beauty and heritage.

"Alan is one of the many fantastic guests with a passion for Scottish culture and heritage that we have spoken to this season, following on from Sam Heughan in our last episode. There are not many of our guests who have had such a varied a career as Alan's, from working as a journalist in Dundee to performing in the bright lights of Broadway.
